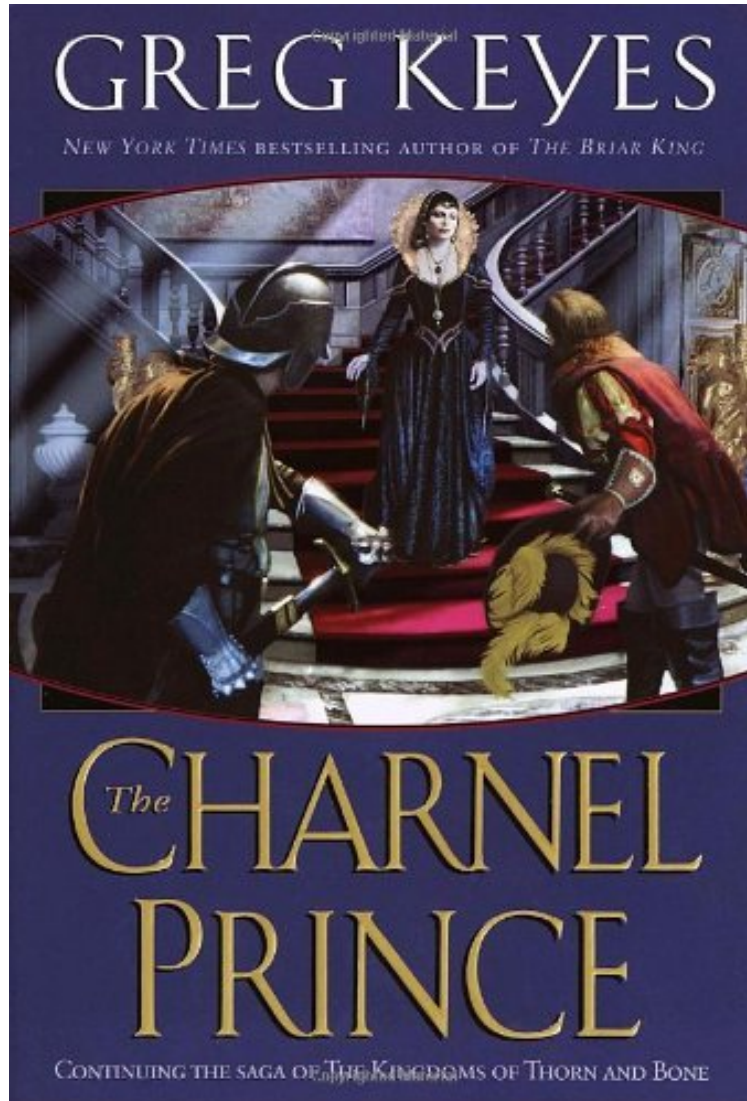

Der Autor hat eine stimmige und eigenständige Fantasywelt erschaffen, die stark an das europäische (Spt-) Mittelalter, bzw. die Renaissance angelehnt ist. Die Protagonisten sind allesamt sehr gelungen und fesseln den Leser an die spannende Story. Das Buch ist teilweise sehr blutig, aber nicht in einer effektheierischen Art. Besonders gut gefallen hat mir die Magie und die Religion, beides ist sehr schön ausgearbeitet und fügt sich nahtlos in den Hintergrund ein. Die Geschichte setzt genau dort ein, wo der erste Teil endet und die Charaktere sind zum größten Teil die gleichen geblieben, auch wenn die Schwerpunkte teilweise etwas verlagert wurden. Die Welt wird durch die Reisen der Protagonisten weiter ausgebaut und bekannt. Teilweise ist es fast schon ein wenig zu viel Information, die man bekommt, aber stets ist die Hintergrundwelt stimmig und stimmungsvoll beschrieben.
